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FROM THE PASTOR

The woman who had been suffering from haemorrhages for twelve years, ..., had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, for she said, 'If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well.' Immediately her haemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease.

Jesus said to her, 'Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease'

(Mark 5.25–29,34)

Many of us, like the woman who was suffering from a 12-year haemorrhage, understand what it is to suffer for a long period of time. Suffering surfaces in many ways: ill health, lack of work or meaningful work, broken relationships, isolation, loss of hope, fear, fleeing from one's home country as a refugee, and so on. We may believe that the suffering will not have any reprieve. I suspect that this woman had lost hope for her own healing. And then 'she heard about Jesus (vs.27).' Could it be that Jesus, the healer, could do something for her? Could she stir up enough hope, to after so many failed attempts, risk once more? How many temptations to despair did she have to overcome to try one more time? How could she, as one forced to live at the edges of society because of her situation, muster up enough courage to make one last attempt? 'If I but touch his clothes' unnoticed by anyone, will I be healed? Yes, she would exert herself one last time. She touches the fringe of Jesus' clothes. And with that touch there is immediate healing! What?! Is the healing real? Is it complete? Will it last? Who is this man, this healer? Her prison doors have been flung open. Her isolation is behind her. She has a totally new life. Because of him!

Many, through the experience of our faith community, have experienced this kind of miraculous healing. They have new life because of him! They have reached out to touch Jesus. They have allowed Jesus to touch them. They will never again be the same. Deeper faith has been born through a risk of faith. Isolation is no more. Battered souls have been healed. A new hope has arisen. A singular encounter with the risen Lord has made all the difference in this world and in the next. We thank and praise the Father, Jesus and the Holy Spirit for actively seeking us out. He is the one who leaves the ninety-nine in search of the one. If you are one who has not yet experienced the healing touch of God, then may the Lord run toward you, embrace you, lift you up in his arms, and fill you with his saving love and mercy!!



Here's part of the miracle: you, the disciples who have been transformed by his love, are the same agents of supreme good news as in this gospel account. The woman with the haemorrhage heard about Jesus through disciple-making disciples. The courage to share our own faith stories gives others confidence to approach Jesus with their own wounds. We intentionally rely on the Holy Spirit to prompt us to reach out beyond ourselves. God's mercy to us provides a bridge over which others come to Jesus. Our warm hearts are attractive to those who yearn for healing love.

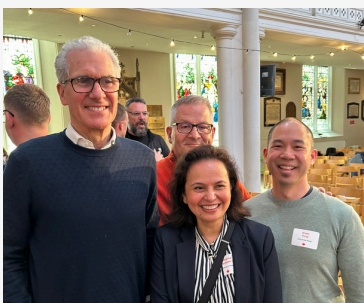

Come, Holy Spirit! 🙏



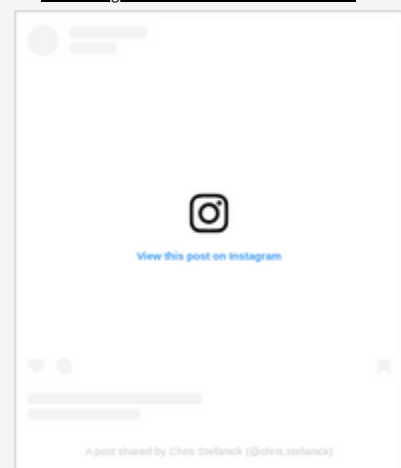

The gold band reminds us of our 'Communion in Christ' embracing Saint Patrick & Holy Family Parishes. It also speaks to us of the gift of the Eucharist

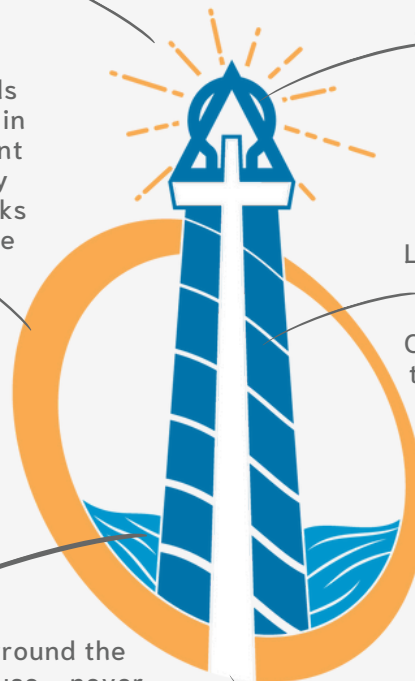
The stripes on the Lighthouse refer to the formation path of disciples, up toward Christ. The path equips the saints for ministry

First, the charity and warmth with which we were met by our parish's Senior Leadership Team allowed the outreach idea to become a flourishing ministry.

Upon the ministry being confirmed, we were repeatedly blessed with generosity, our gratitude for which can scarcely be expressed. First, from our Lord, for putting outreach on our hearts, and granting the very name of the ministry to us during prayer. Next, for the donations and overwhelming support from our own family of parishes, easily among the most amazing aspects of this ministry. No part of this would be possible if not for the selfless giving of every one of you.



Warm-Hearted

We recognize every person as an image-bearer of God. By joining people in their suffering and walking with one another, we are mutually transformed by Christ's love.

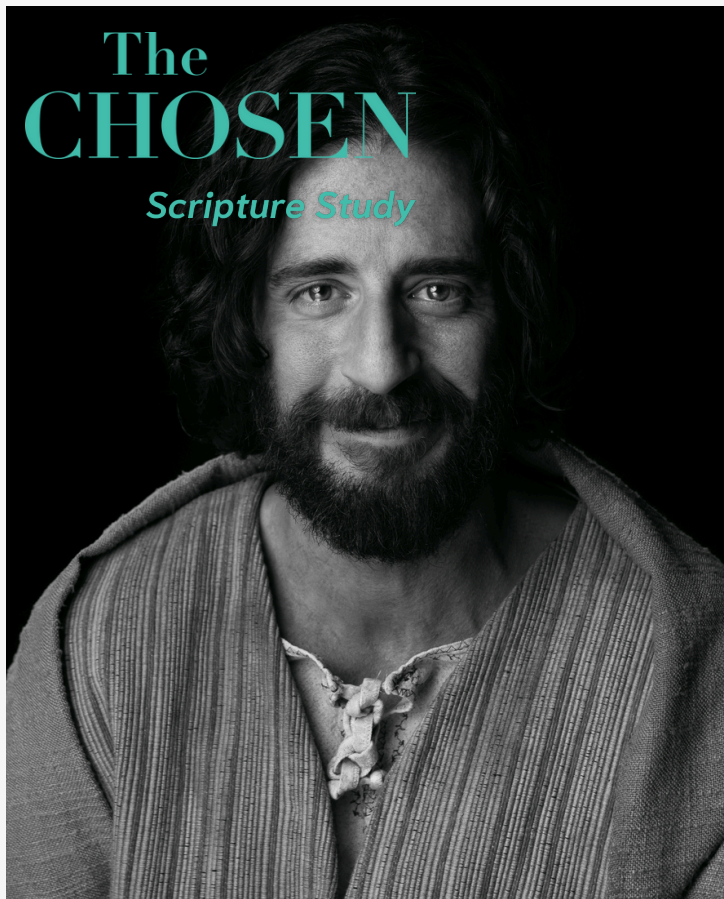

Here are some reflections from people who took part in group:

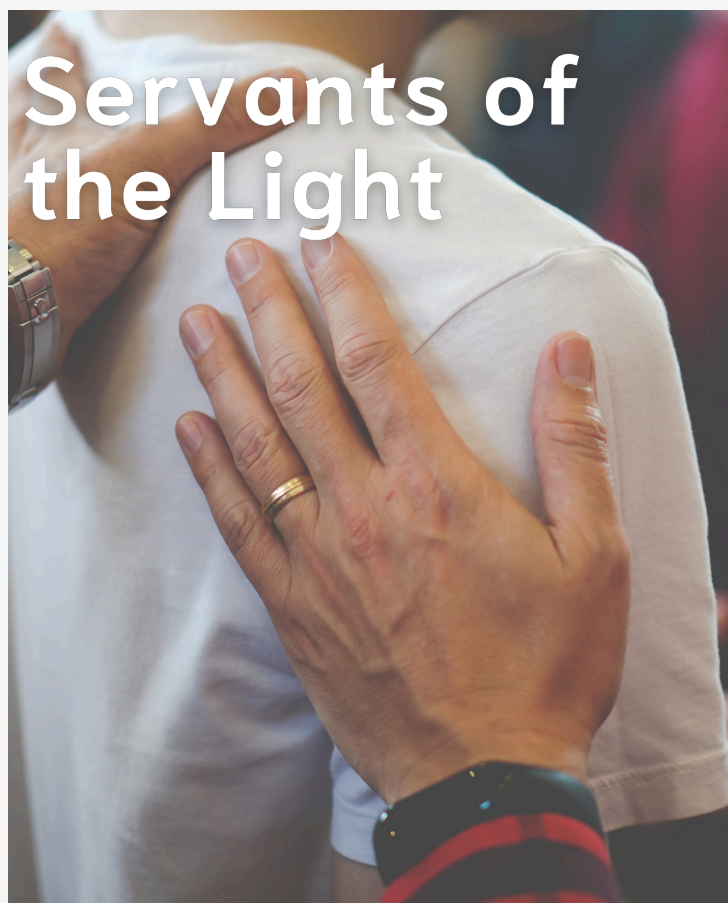

The Servants of the Light community is the home of our parish Intercessory Prayer group, and also the hub for our Prayer Ministry after Masses, for special events, and also for impromptu prayer with individuals who seek us out.

In our faith journey, each of our members has come to the realization that Jesus died and was resurrected to save us from our sin. This has brought us each to an attitude of gratitude. Most of our prayer group members are retirees, though not all, and one of our first areas of gratitude is that we have been called to serve the Lord in this ministry. We are grateful that others feel the call of the Lord to join us in interceding in our post-mass Prayer Ministry.

We are grateful for the development by our pastor, Father Bob, and his team of the five Core Values of The Lighthouse (Lighthouse Living). Our gratitude to God for this blessing helps us to function and focus on these values in our ministry.

We are grateful to have people join us on Wednesday afternoons for our prayer meetings, from wherever they have been called by the Lord.



Spirit-Reliant

We are dependent on the Holy Spirit's prompting and direction – that we might respond more fully to Jesus' mission to make disciples of all nations.




We have members from South Africa, Nigeria, Tobago, Italy, Poland, and many other cities and countries. These beautiful children of God, coming from elsewhere, bring a sense of global community to us, as we learn new things from each other. We are a family and our ministry and community extends around the world. People are attracted to the warm-heartedness of our group and are drawn to us by their own spirit reliance.

We are grateful that we are called to meet together each week in every season, to sing praise and worship to our God, and to spend time listening to Him in prophecy, visions, and Scripture, when there are other demands on our times. In this, we are Spirit-Reliant and Scripture-Soaked.

We are particularly grateful to be called to pray in intercession for others in our meetings, and after Masses and other occasions. This charism is reflective of warm heartedness, and our call to be Beacons of Hope.

Our greatest gratitude is our unity in Christ, in the sacraments, and in our lives of faith in Servants of the Light. Christ is very present in and with us. We seek Jesus in the Eucharist when we break bread together with other parishioners in Holy Grounds Café, and then as we pray, sing in Praise and Worship and intercede for others in our prayer meetings. In all of these activities we are called to all five of our Lighthouse Core Values.

We are grateful for the intentionality and obedience to the Will of God of those who meet with us, and those who pray with us.

If you feel called to join us in our prayer meetings, ask for members of our Core team at Holy Grounds Café. If you feel called to join us in praying after weekend Masses for people, speak to members of the prayer team after any Mass you attend. 



The group started more than 25 years ago with the purpose of making quilts and comforters for Birthright. It has broadened to include comforters for parishioners, Children's Aid, Merrymount Children's Centre, Mount Hope and St. Joseph's Hospice.

We provide comforters that serve as a symbol of God's love for people facing difficult situations, such as illness, hospitalization, surgery, bereavement or other challenges.

When we choose our pattern and fabric and sew our comforters we think of the person, adult or child who will receive it. When we make comforters for refugees in our parish, we depict Canada and their home country.

We also donate comforters for fundraising, specifically the Brother Blaise Outreach Program in Peru and Holy Family Parish's Annual Bazaar. We welcomed six newcomers to our group and the seasoned sewers have used this ministry as an opportunity to share their faith and talents. This exemplifies our parishes' vision of being disciple making-disciples.



Our goal is to bring warmth to those receiving the comforters, purpose to our crafting, enjoyment in our friendships and exchange as fellow parishioners.

Our ministry reflects the Core Values of being Warm-Hearted, Scripture-Soaked and Beacons of Hope. Making comforters allows us to share our love and care for others, to make them feel special and appreciated. They can feel and experience the warmth of our prayers, thoughts and caring. We use donated unused fabric and pieces of scraps rather than disposing these items into landfill sites to take one small step toward protecting the environment for future generations. The giving of our time, talents and the enjoyment in the making of the comforters is summed up in 2 Corinthians 9.7: **"Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."**

From September 2023 to May 2024, we made 104 comforters, including 20 for the Children's Aid Society and 40 for parishioners. People are touched by our ministry: one said being gifted a hand-made comforter "felt like I was wrapped in a protective cocoon of love and support" while another said it "brought hope into my uncertain times." 🕯️

Stitches of Comfort

The Stitches of Comfort Ministry are a dedicated group of women who meet and create beautiful blankets and comforters. Their creations are then given to those who may need one. These "fabric hugs" are given in love and care to those who may be feeling lonely, ill, or have experienced loss.

They meet every Monday Afternoon at 1:00pm at Holy Family Parish in the Mother of Peace Room.

The group leaders were supportive and encouraged us to ask questions during discussions. My favourite moment of Alpha was attending Mass with my group.

After Alpha, I completed RCIA and celebrated Baptism and Confirmation during Easter at Holy Family Parish. I now have a personal connection with God. I find comfort in knowing that He has a plan. I am reading the Bible and praying more often. I am also attending Church groups to deepen my faith, make friends and learn from others.

What is:

Alpha - an 11-week series answering the question of "Is there more to life than this?" by introducing who Jesus and the Holy Spirit are and the Christian faith

RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) - the process of introducing the Catholic and preparing those who want to be received into the Catholic Church

When I felt called to join the Catholic Church, transitioning from Protestantism, I was intimidated. As a 22-year-old man, I sought the fullness of truth. My faith was missing something, I hungered for the Eucharist and sacred tradition.

Upon contacting Holy Family parish, I met Lisa Wright, our Sacramental Preparation Coordinator, who introduced me to the Alpha Series. The weekly Alpha sessions fostered unity among participants from diverse faith backgrounds, while also offering enjoyable refreshments. After Alpha had ended, non-Catholic Alpha attendees, including myself, embarked on the RCIA journey, delving into key Catholic beliefs such as sacraments, devotions, Mother Mary, saints and the hierarchy of heaven.

Each catechumen was paired with a practising Catholic sponsor who guided them through the program. After nearly a year since beginning Alpha, our group concluded the journey by collectively embracing Catholicism, receiving Confirmation and first Holy Communion together. These programs provide remarkable opportunities to fully commit to the Catholic faith and partake in its sacraments, notably the Eucharist. If you feel called to embrace Jesus in the fullness of truth, I urge you to join Alpha and RCIA, witnessing the miracles that unfold.

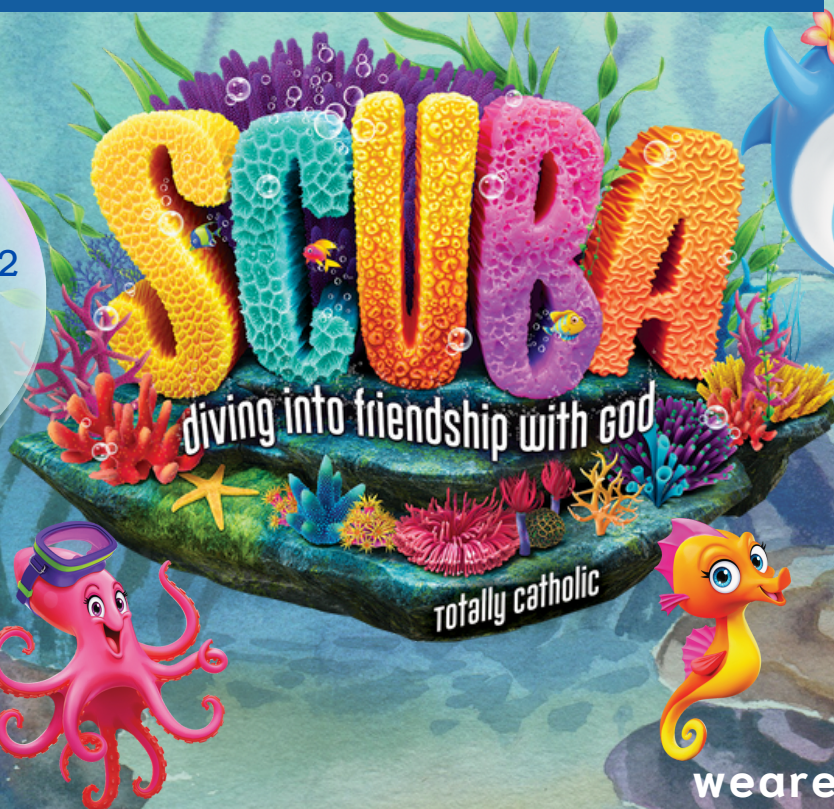
